




Q2: What kinds of improvements are necessary to improve/increase your access to existing Town open space facilities? Choose all that apply.




Q4: What would you most like to see additional public dollars spent on for recreation? Choose all that apply.




Q9: Is having thriving village centers (North Egremont and South Egremont) important to you?


Q10: What would you like to preserve in the village of North Egremont? (Choose all that apply.)


Q11: What would you like to change in the village of North Egremont? (Choose all that apply.)


Q12: What would you like to preserve in the village of South Egremont?






Q16: Would you like to see more options for economic development in Egremont?

SECOND PUBLIC WORKSHOP: SAMPLE THEMATIC PAIRS

- Housing: Affordable housing options vs. preference for no additional development.
- Economic development: Concentration in the Villages vs. spread into residential/rural areas.
- Economic development: Supporting active farming operations vs. concern about impact on environment
- Physical connections: Linking open space with wildlife corridors vs. linking built areas with bike paths/sidewalks.
- Community Connections: New facilities vs. maintaining/enhancing/programming existing facilities.
- Land Protection: Private protected land vs. Publicly protected land with public access.
- Environmental Protection: Responsibility of Town vs. role of private efforts (landowners, volunteers, organizations.
- Municipal Resources: Community desires vs. ability to fund, manage, and maintain.



More business development, demographic shift away from aging population, affordable and workforce housing.

POTENTIAL THEME:

How does the community manage a demographic shift to an aging population?

THE most important issue is affordable and senior housing.

More affordable housing is needed but should be done w/o rezoning for "development" and no multilevel units and with maintaining rural character.

POTENTIAL THEME:

How does Egremont balance the development of housing with a preference for the existing rural development pattern?

This (affordable housing) should be very high on the list of town's priorities.

Limit building of ALL new homes: Egremont has enough housing.

Egremont is not unique in our need for affordable housing but I strongly believe that without much more of it, our town, as beautiful as it is, will wither.

The natural beauty and rural nature of the town; prevent development that is not in line with these values.

Preserve the historical character of Egremont. And the small-town vibe – don't allow too many businesses/commerce to enter and lost the cozy feel of the village.

We already have too many economic development options because of the special permit process which allows businesses interspersed in residential areas. Home occupations with no outward impacts should be the only economic uses in residential areas. Other needs are well-provided by neighboring towns, and all towns don't have to look alike. Keep Egremont mainly residential.

While we should preserve the rural character of the outer areas of the town, the villages need development. Commercial businesses should be encouraged in the two villages, especially south village. The re-build of 23 will help that with new sidewalks, but we need more parking and ability for business to come into the existing buildings without the special permit hoops everyone is forced to go though.

I have been part of Egremont since I was born in 1934. From 1934 to 1954 Egremont was an Eden. I was a farmhand on Baldwin Hill Farm until I left for other job opportunities in 1958. I have lived by the old time values that I learned on the farm throughout my life. I would like those values understood and valued by people new to the community.

POTENTIAL THEME:

How can the Town support community-building among long-term and newer residents?

I want to preserve the sense of community by creating a center where people can meet, play, get together. We should have bought the golf course or church!

Create a community center so there is a place for the community to meet and host activities for people of all ages.

Would like to have more community events that are open to all age groups and people are more inclusive and inviting to second home owners.

People who move here need to be given a pamphlet describing how best to fit in with the town and the natural environment. So many people are not aware how different country life is.

Make the roads more safe for bikers and pedestrians. Add bike lanes on Jug End Road, Creamery Rd. and Rte. 71. Create a shared space for music and festivals like a band stand or gazebo at French Park. Add more benches and a gazebo to the town green in So. Egremont for celebrations like Memorial Day, July 4, Town's anniversary and Veterans Day.
